I'm a junior doctor; get me out of here!

Against the backdrop of a health service in crisis, low morale, colleagues leaving, and not infrequently frustrated patients, do you find yourself overwhelmed and questioning whether or not you still want to be a junior doctor? While remaining real about current challenges, what can help to stay training and working as Christians in medicine? We will explore aspects of calling, work, lament and how we might survive and thrive as junior doctors.

Why God wants you in leadership (and how you are already)!

More than ever, medicine needs God's Kingdom values, from caring, compassionate patient care to leading teams to the allocation of finite resources and big ethical issues.

And do you know what? Someone decides all these things; someone models all these things well (or not), and if you don't, someone else will. However, they will not be filled with the Holy Spirit, are unlikely to hold to God's Kingdom values, and are less likely to serve in their leadership.

The perils of 'scepticaemia'? A workshop for cynical healthcare workers.

Some say cynicism is a life jacket that prevents us from drowning in disappointment. But in practice, cynicism leads to a pathological mistrust of others that can sink our faith. Jesus was neither cynical nor naïve. He showed us how to remain spiritually buoyant. The gospel gives us good reasons to remain hope-filled and warmhearted. While he laments with us in our disappointments, he always refocuses us on the light that has overcome the darkness.

Alex Bunn is the lead GP for Wandsworth Prison, a former CMF staff worker, and a keen beekeeper.



Abortion and the junior doctor

Christian junior doctors might find themselves asking several questions about abortion: How might juniors expect to be involved with caring for women who are considering or seeking an abortion or who have had an abortion in the past? Will this be different if I have a rotation through or choose to train in Obs & Gynae, as a GP, or in Anaesthetics? Are there ways inside or outside work that I could offer better support to both expectant mothers and their unborn babies? This seminar will aim to offer a refresher on the Christian ethics of caring well for women and their unborn children. We will also consider questions like those above as we consider how a Christian junior doctor can be positively engaged with their care.

SPEAKERS

Susan Marriott is CMF's Head of Public Policy. She previously trained and worked as a GP in and around Cambridge. She has also undertaken theological training and is currently enjoying combining both these strands while working for CMF.

Paula Busuulwa is a trainee in obstetrics and gynaecology, currently out of programme in London, and Chair of the CMF Junior Doctors' Committee.



Speaking for Christ in the 'Culture Wars' engaging with contentious issues in the public square

The last decade has seen identity politics transform public discourse across the British Isles. Debates on ethical and cultural issues, such as abortion, gender, and assisted suicide, have become increasingly heated and polarised. Christians are often viewed as intolerant oppressors who need to be shut down and sidelined. How can we navigate these culture wars as junior doctors in sensitive, faithful, and credible ways? What specific opportunities might we use to speak out in our unique contexts?

SPEAKERS

Mark Pickering is CMF's Chief Executive and a prison GP. He has wide interests in apologetics and bioethics and has been involved in these areas since being a CMF student member in the late 90s. He loves engaging with people who disagree with him, finding common ground, and improving contentious conversations.

Ben Chang is a speaker, writer, and A&E Registrar. He regularly speaks at conferences, universities, and churches on a range of issues, including medical ethics, identity politics, and cultural engagement. He is also the author of *Christ and the Culture Wars: Speaking for Jesus in a World of Identity Politics.*

Ethical problems of AI in healthcare: the old and the new

Al and new digital technologies are going to have a disruptive effect on healthcare worldwide. While many of the ethical concerns, such as privacy, equity, and bias, are longstanding, there are genuinely new issues to debate. Should Al systems be used to obtain informed consent or to predict an unconscious patient's treatment preferences? What about companion bots for vulnerable adults or therapy bots for CBT? How does a Christian understanding of humanity engage with the challenges of the brave new world of automated healthcare?

SPEAKER

John Wyatt is Emeritus Professor of Neonatal Paediatrics at UCL and President of CMF. His background is in clinical neonatology and applied neuroscience, but his main focus now is on ethical challenges raised by advances in digital and biomedical technology.



Clothed with joy

The things that can make us good doctors can also make us more likely to become unwell through suffering burnout, vicarious trauma, and compassion fatigue. In the current climate, moral injury is also increasingly being identified as a source of disease among health professionals. Yet there can be deep joy in the journey God calls us to, both as God's children and in the health care roles in which we serve. In this seminar, through the lens of Psalm 30, we will consider and frame these different risks to our health and wellbeing. We will reflect on what it means to respond to the invitation of God to live and work out of a place of God's joyful shalom.

SPEAKER

Rhona Knight was a GP, medical educator, and academic for over 25 years, focusing latterly on the health and wellbeing of healthcare professionals. Following ordination, she developed an interest in ministering in times of trauma. She is the author of the Grove Booklet, Mission in a Time of Trauma.



Global health at home: Meeting the physical and spiritual health needs of refugees and asylum seekers in the UK

More people are displaced than at any other point in human history. Refugees and asylum seekers often have complex health needs yet face multiple barriers to achieving health equity. This workshop will provide an overview of Refugee and Asylum Seeker health in the UK, considering how we can respond as Christian healthcare professionals.

Aaron Poppleton is a clinical academic and educational trainer in General Practice. He is pursuing a PhD in crosscultural care. He is the chair of the CMF Global Committee and has worked, studied, and taught in countries across Europe.
